- a. Identify any five of these problems. (5marks)
- b. As a classroom teacher, use the diagram below, to show how you will derive specific classroom objectives from general aims in your subject of specialization. as suggested by Wheeler (1985)

QUESTION 4

Three of the eight principles for the selection and organization of curriculum content outlined by Skilbeck's, (1976: 102) are:

Articulation, Sequence and Balance.

QUESTION 5

"The concept of culture I espouse...... is essentially a semiotic one. Believing that man is an animal suspended in webs of significance he himself has spurn. I take culture to be those webs and the analysis of it to be therefore, not an experimental science in search of the law, but an interpretative one in search of meaning". (Gertz, 1975)

- b. Discuss two challenges experienced by the teacher as a result of this infusion. (5marks)
