Question 1

Drawing your illustrations from **either** one character's life story in <u>Neighbours</u> **or** from Noumbe in "Her Three Days", discuss how a writer may choose to use flashback to create a fully realised character. [30]

"In Shakespearean tragedy, the tragic hero retains the audience's sympathy even when his hamartia or tragic flaw overtakes him because *he is viewed from the inside.*" In a well-illustrated essay, relate this theoretical assertion to Macbeth's portrayal in Macbeth. [30]

Question 3

Focusing on well selected scenes in <u>Twelfth Night</u>, discuss the use of dramatic intervention in Shakespearean comedy to maintain the play's comedic thrust and humorous tone and to ensure its happy ending. [30]

Question 4

Read the excerpt below and then answer the question which follows it:

"Oppression can take many forms. Neighbours was written out of my horror at the way countries can abuse each other's sovereignty for their own ends and with impunity. Like many Mozambicans, I lived through decades when South Africa did as it pleased in Mozambique in order to protect the interests of the apartheid regime. During this period many Mozambicans were killed or had their lives destroyed." (Preface)

Respond to the above excerpt by discussing how Momple has, through choice of incidents and characters, imaginatively portrayed her horror in <u>Neighbours</u>. [30]

Question 5

Which scene constitutes the moment of recognition and reversal in <u>Macbeth</u>? Discuss with the aid of illustrations. [30]

Question 6

Discuss the roles of Sir Andrew and Sir Toby in advancing the Christmastide theme and maintaining the humour of <u>Twelfth Night</u>. [30]

Question 7

Do you consider Dan Jacobson's "Beggar My Neighbour" to constitute social criticism or just mere entertainment? Discuss fully. [30]
