I've spent the past weekend watching the news in horror, channel-hopping to find out more about the Kenyan mall hostage situation. As I write this, at least 68 people are confirmed dead and many others are being held hostage.

This shopping centre- Westgate Mall- is very popular with tourists. My husband and two boys shopped there when they visited Kenya in July. We have friends, colleagues and even some family living in Kenya and our thoughts and prayers go out to our Kenyan brothers during this ordeal.

Another schocking story this past week was that of a 16-year-old Vanderbiljpark boy who was bullied and forced to drink urine by some white boys at his school. I'm from Vanderbiljpark and I know the school in question. Because of its proud rugby history, it is one of the few schools my parents considered when they wanted to enroll my brother in school but they were advised against it. Institutionalised racism was one of the most common complaints black parents were forced to make there.

Luckily, there is another excellent "rugby school" nearby where my brother was accepted and thrived until he finished matric. But his years there were not without racial niggles from parents and even learners, which we managed because my brothe loved it there.

My point is that we are not yet out of the racist woods in South Africa- far from it. Whether be it white on black or black on white, the fact remains that we live in one of the most inherently racist countries. Obviously, apartheid is to blame for most of it but apartheid ended 20 years ago. The boys who committed these acts are under 18. So who, if not the parents gave them the impression it would be okay to do such a thing?
