- (c) Which court has jurisdiction to determine the status of a person. Cite relevant case law. (5)

## Question 4

It is generally accepted that the law sits in the bosom of judges, expressed in the maxim jura novit curia (judges know the law). However, Van Wyk JA in Schlessinger V Commissioner for Inland Revenue

1964 (3) SA 389 declared that "our courts cannot take judicial notice (of foreign law)..." Discuss this latter statement in the context of Professor Cheshire's four-staged approach to the application of the multilateral choice of law rules. [25 Marks]

Citing relevant case law and legislation, give a detailed account of the law governing the recognition and enforcement of foreign judgments in Swaziland.
