QUESTION ONE

Mjikeni and Mchalageni of Hlathikhulu Kontjingila area under Chief Gelane are married by civil rites in 1982. MCHAlageni has always been employed in Zimbabwe, working in the Zimbabwe Gold Mines. Two years back, Mchalageni left for work in the Mine in Zimbabwe soon after the Christmas holidays. Mchalageni has not been heard of since. All effort has been made to trace his whereabouts to no avail. The couple have four children, Mshubegaca, Somabhizinisi, Lungile and Mbokodvo. However, Mshubegaca was only conceived three months before Mchalageni disappeared and Mjikeni had not yet informed him of her pregnancy. Acting on the advice of his lawyer in Simunye, Mchalageni had executed a will before his disappearance, specifically leaving all his property to his wife, and all his four children in equal shares. Meanwhile, Mjikeni has met Nonjola who wants to marry her. Mjikeni would now like to seek legal advice from you, specifically on whether she can marry Nonjola and how the property of the estate shall devolve.
